WORK DEFINITIONS IN "THE DOCTOR'S OPINION"

Abnormal: not natural, deviating from the normal or average.

Abstinence: willful avoidance of pleasure, especially food or drink.

<u>Addiction</u>: a state of being given up to devotion or surrender (of oneself) to something habitually or obsessively.

Aggregate: the sum total.

Allergy: an abnormal reaction to any food, substance or beverage.

<u>Altruistic</u>: concern for the welfare of others as opposed to egoism or selfishness.

Annals: history. Befogged: confused.

Chronic: constantly present; frequently recurring.

Conception: a general idea or understanding.

<u>Consented</u>: to give approval of what is asked.

<u>Craving</u>: an insatiable desire or longing for more of the same. (Always the physical factor after the substance is ingested.)

<u>Cynical</u>: distrustful of human nature; inclined to question the sincerity and goodness of people.

<u>Defective</u>: lacking something essential to be complete.

<u>Deterioration</u>: becoming worse.

<u>Differentiate</u>: recognize a difference.

<u>Distinct</u>: distinguished as not being the same, not identical.

<u>Drug</u>: a substance other than food taken into the body that changes its function.

Elusive: evasive, hard to comprehend or define.

Emotionally: related to feelings.

Entity: something that exists on its own.

Epoch: an event or a time that begins a new period or development.

Eradicated: done away with completely.

<u>Fellowship</u>: a group of people with the same interests or experiences.

Gastric Hemorrhage: bleeding pertaining to the stomach.

Imperative: mandatory, urgent.

Impulse: a sudden urge.

<u>Impunity</u>: without punishment, harm or loss.

Inadequacy: insufficiency.

<u>Inherent</u>: existing in someone or something as a natural and inseparable quality.

Jittery: nervous, uneasy.

<u>Layman</u>: people who do not have special or advanced training or skills.

Maladjusted: lacking harmony with one's environment; poorly adjusted to one's life.

Manic-depressive: having a mental disorder marked by excitation and depression.

Manifestation: something easily perceived by the senses or mind, an indication.

Mental: relating to the mind; will power.

Misgiving: a feeling of doubt or suspicion concerning a future event.

Moral Psychology: on page xxvii he is talking about a spiritual awakening, but on page xxxi he is talking about the psychology that was generally practiced at the time.

Opinion: a belief or conclusion held with confidence but not substantiated by positive knowledge or proof.

<u>Paramount</u>: of chief concern or importance, primary, foremost.

<u>Pathological</u>: pertaining to disease.

<u>Phenomenon</u>: something known by the senses but not understood by the mind.

<u>Precipitates</u>: to bring about, causes to happen.

Psychiatric: the medical study, diagnosis, treatment and prevention of mental illness.

Psychic: pertaining to the mind.

Psychological: pertaining to psychology – mind and behavior.

<u>Psychopath</u>: a person with a personality disorder, especially one manifested in aggressively antisocial behavior.

Reality: the truth.

Remorseful: feeling guilt for past wrongs.

Resolution: a strong vow or promise.

Scoff: to show or treat with contempt by ridiculing acts or language.

Scope: the range of one's perception, thought or action.

<u>Sickened</u>: causing sickness. <u>Soundness</u>: correctness.

Specimen: an individual item or part representative of a whole.

Spree: a drinking bout.

Succumbed: giving into the overwhelming desire.

Symptom: evidence of disease.

Synthetic: man-made.

<u>Temperate</u>: exercising moderation or self-restraint.

Theory: a plausible principle used to explain something.

<u>Ultra-modern</u>: the very latest.

<u>Unstable</u>: tending strongly to change, not constant, characterized by inability to control

emotions.

Will Power: strong determination.
